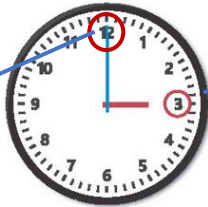
Key Knowledge

Tell (and draw) the time to the hour:

At the hour, the **minute hand** points to the 12.

3 o'clock

The long hand is the **minute** hand.



The short hand is the **hour** hand.

The **hour hand** points to the hour.

Tell (and draw) the time to the half hour:

At half past, the **minute hand** is half way round the clock, pointing to the 6.

Half past 2



The **hour hand** will be **halfway** between one hour and the next hour.

Sequence events in chronological order using language (before and after, next, first, today, yesterday, tomorrow, morning, afternoon and evening):



Describe the order you put the clothes on.

Today is **Monday**.

In the **morning**, I eat my breakfast.

Key Vocabulary and definitions

Time	To measure how long it takes for things to happen, how long-ago things happened in the past and when things may happen in the future. To measure what time in the day it is.
Clock	Shows time, indicates hours, minutes, and sometimes seconds, by hands on a clock face (or digital, like on a phone).
Hour	A length of time equal to 60 minutes.
Minute	A length of time equal to 60 seconds.
Clock hands	The hands (pointers) show the time on an analogue clock.
O'clock	Used to specify the hour when telling the time e.g., 5 o'clock.
Half past	Thirty minutes after an hour.
Day	There are 24 hours in a day.
Month	There are 12 months in a year: January, February, March, April, May, June, July, August, September, October, November, December .
Week	There are 7 days in a week: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday .
Weekend	Saturday and Sunday .
Year	There are 365 days in a year.
